SUBJECT: Funding Project Connect and Hollister Old Town Interim Striping Projects

RECOMMENDATION:

A. Receive a presentation on the preliminary five-year (2023/2024 - 2027/2028) Capital Improvement Program project delivery and preliminary cost estimates;

- B. Reject all bids for Hollister Old Town Interim Striping Project;
- C. Direct staff to return to City Council on December 5, 2023 to award Project Connect, and include the proposed funding strategy, and related budget adjustments and appropriations;
- D. Direct staff to negotiate a construction change order to Project Connect to construct the Hollister Old Town Interim Striping Project and return to City Council on December 19, 2023 to approve a change order for the Hollister Old Town Interim Striping Project;
- E. Authorize the City Manager or his designee to request an amendment to the Measure A Investment Plan by the Santa Barbara County Association of Governments to transfer the \$8.4 million in Measure A regional funds from the named Goleta US 101 Overcrossing project to the Goleta Transportation Circulation Improvements Project; and
- F. Direct staff to come back in April 2024 to further review the CIP project delivery and options for funding these projects.

BACKGROUND:

Beginning in December 2022, the City Manager worked with Department Directors and staff to develop a draft two-year budget plan that meets existing levels of service and addresses policy direction as provided in the City's updated 2023-2025 Strategic Plan, each department's Annual Work Program, and City Council's priorities from previous

discussions on the general transaction and use tax measure that will go into effect January 1, 2024.

This preliminary two-year budget was first presented to the City Council on May 2, 2023, at a budget workshop. During this workshop, staff provided the Council with an overview of the budget process and approach. Updated revenue and expenditure projections were reviewed, along with updates to the General Fund's projected fund balance and Five-Year Forecast. Staff received feedback from Council and made adjustments accordingly.

A second budget workshop, held on May 23, 2023, provided the City Council the opportunity to review and discuss the updated Comprehensive Capital Improvement Plan, and Capital Improvement Program (CIP) Budget for Fiscal Years (FY) 2023/24 and 2024/25. During this budget workshop, staff provided the Council with an overview of the Comprehensive CIP, and the three main components. The three components include a Comprehensive CIP Project List, the Five-Year CIP Project List and the CIP Budget for FY 2023/24 and 2024/25. Furthermore, the Council was briefed on the ongoing progress of key projects undertaken by the Public Works, Neighborhood Services, and General Services departments. The review also included updated project costs, new funding amounts and estimated unfunded amounts.

On June 6, 2023, a third budget workshop was held to provide the Council with an update on the Preliminary Operating and Capital Improvement Budgets for FY 2023/24 and 2024/25 and seek feedback on the direction given at the previous workshops. Specific budgetary issues were discussed, including Library Funding and Book Van, Creeks and Watershed Management Plan and Program and review of the new general transaction and use tax measure suggested funding table.

Based on feedback provided by the Council at the workshops, along with additional analysis and information provided by staff, updates were made to refine the overall budget estimates.

On June 20, 2023, Council adopted the FY 2023/24 and 2024/25 budget. The budget covered the Comprehensive CIP Work Program and noted projects with unfunded balances. Given the persistent volatility of the economy and the revelation of higher than anticipated CIP project costs from recent bids, staff expect that the FY 2023/24 and 2024/25 budgets will necessitate regular reviews and adjustments in the upcoming years.

DISCUSSION

The Public Works CIP Division is responsible for constructing, maintaining, and repairing City infrastructure such as roads, bridges, drainage facilities, and traffic signals. The City of Goleta owns over 100 parcels and approximately 85 centerline miles of right-of-way. Many of the City-owned properties are parks and open spaces with a total area of approximately 515 acres. Public Works manages or collaborates with other departments to maintain the 85 centerline miles of roadway traffic signals and 16 other traffic devices, 1,400 LED streetlights, 16 parks, and 14 open spaces, 14,000 city trees (approximately 8,000 street trees and 6,000 park trees), 12 creeks, 2 miles of coastline, and storm drain infrastructure including storm drainpipes, manholes, and drainage inlets. These assets

are improved, maintained, and prioritized through CIP projects, non-CIP projects, and maintenance projects.

CIP projects improve and enhance public safety, achieve sustainability, enhance livability, and expand economic development. The Comprehensive CIP Project List as adopted on June 20, 2023 and is a list of current, upcoming, and potential future projects that are developed from several sources including City Council direction, departmental recommendations, and policy documents. Additional sources include City Council-approved and adopted documents such as the Development Impact Fee (DIF) Program, Bicycle and Pedestrian Master Plan, UCSB Long Range Development Plan, and projects that address regulatory compliance requirements and meet several of the City's Goals and Policies

Public Works CIP projects are funded from various sources. The major sources of funds available for CIP projects are dedicated funds for the type of use. The use of dedicated funds is restricted by the limitations imposed by local, state or federal laws associated with the funding source. For the most part, funds for the CIP projects are accounted for in the City's special revenue funds and include various DIF funds, transportation related special revenue funds, and major federal and state grants that have been awarded.

Projects that are not completely supported by dedicated revenue or are partially supported by grant revenues in need of matching funds are generally supplemented by the General Fund when funds are available. The City may also receive direct funding for projects from other agencies, jurisdictions, or individuals through grants, loans, donations and/or other subsidies.

Public Works CIP Project Delivery Budget

Based on the latest bidding data and funding limitations known, Public Works has identified 12 projects that the City is obligated to deliver over the next 5 years as shown in Table 1. The obligated projects have been identified based on grant constraints, maintenance needs, or are required by regulatory agencies. The presentation (Attachment 1) will show the full project amounts required to fund the CIPs over the next 5 years, including the funded, grant, and unfunded amounts. The funding sources range from the General Fund to Special Revenue funds such as Measure A, DIF revenues, and various grants. Since DIF revenues are estimates based on the timing of development, it is important to note that these revenues will be revised on an annual basis as more current information regarding the timing of development projects becomes available.

Given the multitude of projects and cost increases over the years, the City is faced with a growing funding gap. The funding gap in the current Five-Year CIP Budget can possibly be addressed by various financing options and strategies, including deferring projects, use of one-time available fund balance, or debt financing. Financing a project with debt without going to voters will require an ongoing commitment of the City's current limited revenue sources unless a project itself is able to generate sufficient revenues over time.

Table 1 shows the CIP Project Delivery Schedule and how the listed 12 project meets City goals and policies.

Hollister Old Town Interim Striping Project

The Hollister Avenue Old Town Interim Striping Project received two (2) bids that were received on August 10, 2023. The engineer's estimate and bid are as follows:

The engineer's estimate for construction costs was \$1,840,943.75. Granite was the lowest responsible bidder at \$4,015,848. However, Granite's bid amount was over 118% more than the engineer's estimate. Toro's bid amount was 144% more than the engineer's estimate. Public Works staff typically recommend an award of a project if the bid is within the engineer's estimate of plus or minus 20%, this bid has come in approximately 5.9 times over that amount. Due to the significant variance between available budget and bid amounts, Public Works staff is recommending that Council reject all bids for the Hollister Old Town Interim Striping Project.

Upon awarding Project Connect, staff recommends negotiating a construction change order with Security Paving for the Hollister Old Town Interim Striping Project. Staff will

collaborate with Security Paving to have this be the first order of work. It is projected that this approach will potentially include a cost savings between \$500,000 and \$1,000,000. Staff anticipates that it can bring an item back to the City Council on December 19, 2023 for approval of the change order to Project Connect for the construction of the Hollister Old Town Interim Striping Project. The work on this Change order will start December 20, 2023 with construction anticipated to start April 2024 due to material procurement lead times.

Project Connect

Project Connect received two (2) bids that were received on October 9, 2023. The engineer's estimate and bid are as follows:

 \$62,746,273.60

The engineer's estimate for construction costs was \$55,021,811.70. Security Pavement was the apparent lowest responsible bidder at \$62,746,273.60. The bid amount was over 14% more than the engineer's estimate (within industry standard variances). Granite's bid amount was over 34% more than the engineer's estimate. Public Works staff will return to Council on December 5, 2023 to award Project Connect to the lowest responsible bidder, Security Paving, in the amount of \$62,746,273.60 with authorization for staff to exceed by 16% as a contingency.

<u>Proposed Funding Strategy for Project Connect and Hollister Old Town Interim Striping Projects</u>

Public Works staff have elevated alternative funding options to fund the above listed projects. The following finding strategies are for councils considerations:

- Defer 7 Proposed Projects from FY2023/24 Work program
- General Fund Temporarily reassign Measure B Public Works Appropriations
- Transfer the \$8.4 million in Measure A regional funds from the named Goleta US 101 Overcrossing project to the Goleta Transportation Circulation Improvements Project
- General Fund Transfer unassigned balance to above listed projects
- Development Impact Fee Transfer unassigned balance to above listed projects

Future CIP Workshops

Public Works will return to City Council in April 2024 to discuss Committed CIP project funding and delivery strategies including the use of debt financing.

FISCAL IMPACTS:

The fiscal impact will depend on City Council action. Staff's proposed funding strategy for Project Connect and Hollister Old Town Interim Striping Projects, will temporarily reduce budget supported by the General Fund and other special revenue funds, and the additional appropriation from the General Fund's unassigned fund balance of \$5 million will go towards closing the funding gap. Approximately \$5.5 million is estimated to be available of one-time fund balance. Should the City Council move forward with staff's proposed funding strategy or alternatives, budget adjustments and appropriations will be as part of the staff report related to Project Connect.

Updated fund balance information will be provided in the Q1 Financial Review and may be adjusted as the City closes its books and completes their audit. In addition revenue sources are continuing to be evaluated, and staff is working on an updated 5-year forecast as part of the FY 24/25 Mid-Cycle budget update.

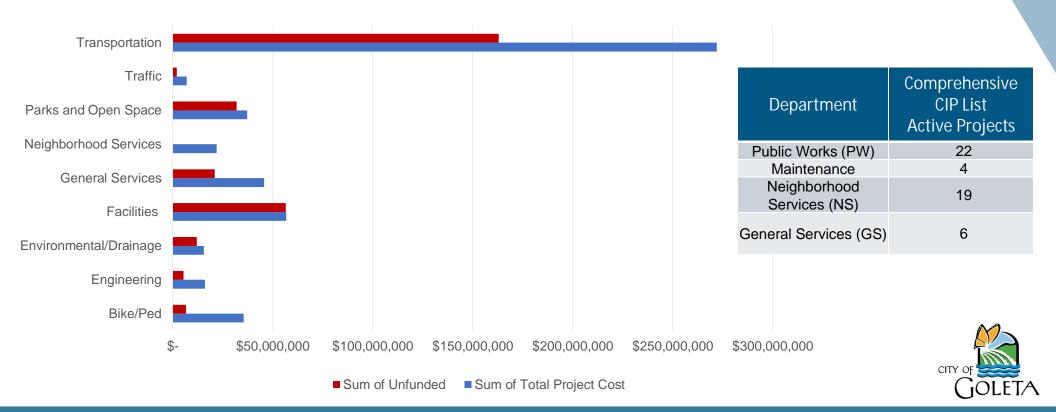

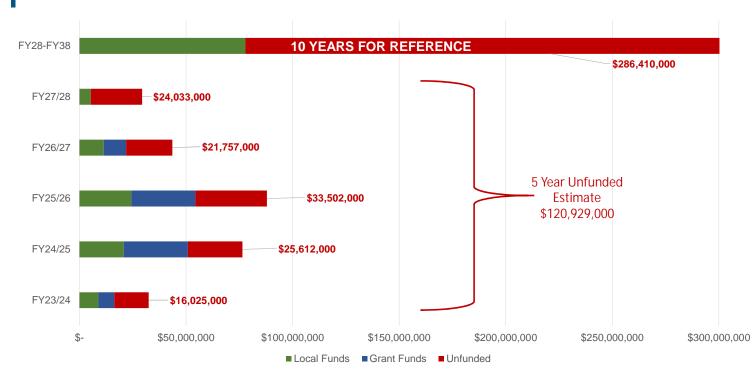

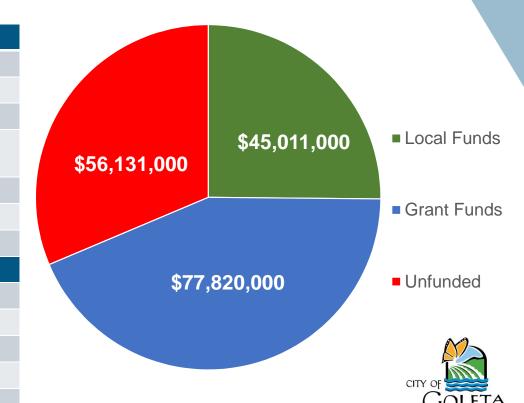

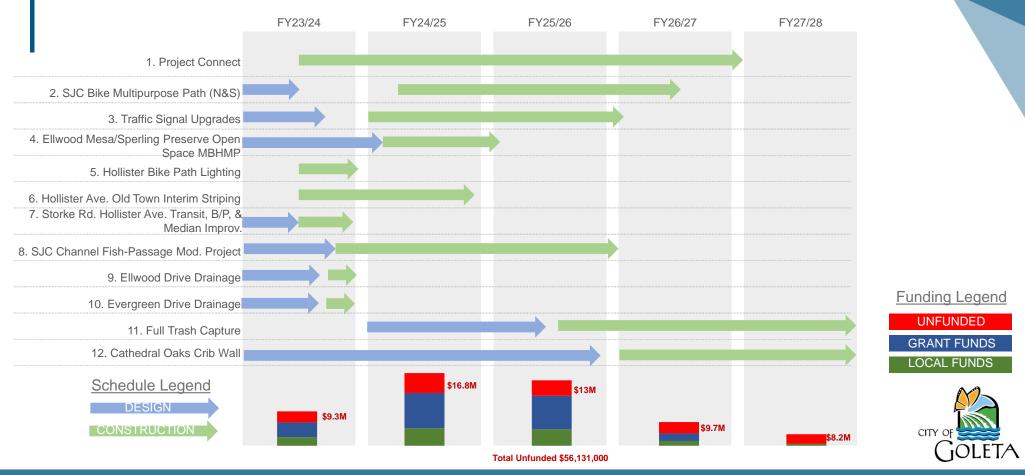

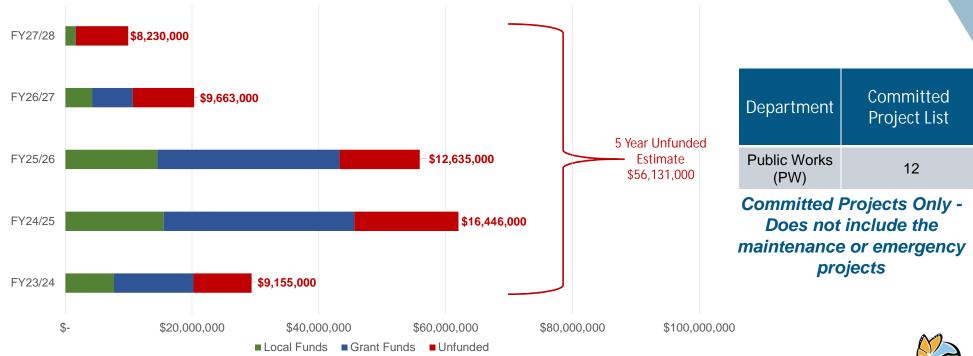

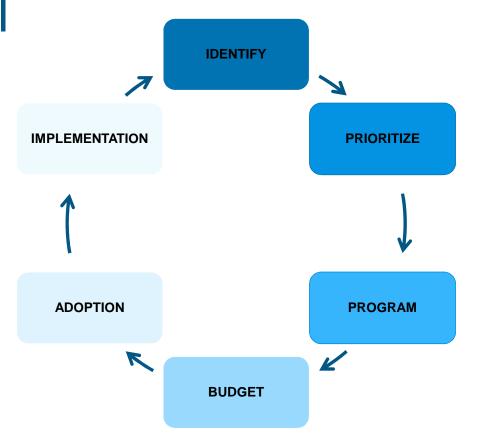

CIP Project Planning Cycle

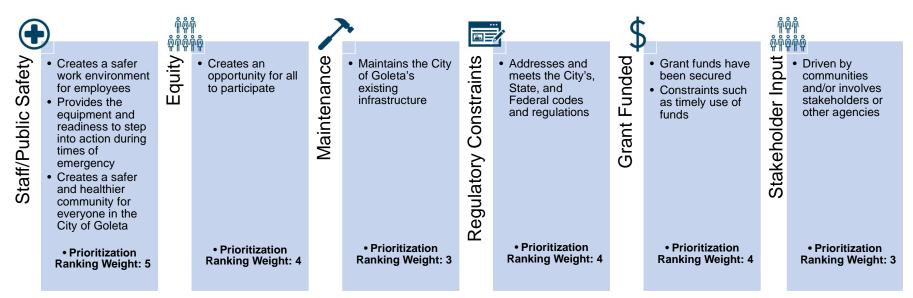


- > IDENTIFY project needs and scope

Project Connect Summary

- Project Connect Award \$62,746,273
- If Council does not take this action:
 - City likely to pay back up to \$9,9M to State and Federal grant agencies
 - City to give up \$50.5M+ in State and Federal grant funding
 - Defer removal of 100-year flood plain in eastern Old Town Goleta
 - Impacts disadvantaged communities and potential redevelopment
 - Potential impacts or damage of the 25-year storm
 - Determine legal and funding issues regarding property acquisitions
 - Risk not receiving any future grants from many agencies



Council Actions

- Receive a presentation on the preliminary five-year (2023/2024 2027/2028) Capital Improvement Program project delivery and preliminary cost estimates;
- Reject all bids for Hollister Old Town Interim Striping Project;
- ➤ Direct staff to return to City Council on December 5, 2023 to award Project Connect, and include the proposed funding strategy, and related budget adjustments and appropriations;
- ➤ Direct staff to negotiate a construction change order to Project Connect to construct the Hollister Old Town Interim Striping Project and return to City Council on December 19, 2023 to approve a change order for the Hollister Old Town Interim Striping Project;
- ➤ Authorize the City Manager or his designee to request an amendment to the Measure A Investment Plan by the Santa Barbara County Association of Governments to transfer the \$8.4 million in Measure A regional funds from the named Goleta US 101 Overcrossing project to the Goleta Transportation Circulation Improvements Project; and
- Direct staff to come back in April 2024 to further review the CIP project delivery and options for funding these projects.
