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## **CR-05 - Goals and Outcomes**

### **Progress the jurisdiction has made in carrying out its strategic plan and its action plan. 91.520(a)**

This could be an overview that includes major initiatives and highlights that were proposed and executed throughout the program year.

The City is making progress on the priorities addressing the needs identified and described in its 2020 - 2024 Consolidated Plan and has completed the fourth year of Consolidated Plan implementation. The priority needs identified in the Consolidated Plan include:

- Provide decent housing by preserving and increasing the affordable housing stock and supporting housing programs for the homeless, including emergency shelters, transitional and permanent housing programs, and homelessness prevention.
- Provide a suitable living environment:
  - Supporting increased affordable housing opportunities and continued improvements for infrastructure reconstruction and public facilities rehabilitation.
  - Increasing supportive services to people with special needs, homeless persons, and low-income persons and families.
- Expand economic opportunities through public infrastructure improvements in Goleta's Old Town District or other low-income Block Groups within the City of Goleta.

For the 2023-2024 Action Plan, the target number of people served for public services was 2,960, with the actual number of people served at 5,217. In PY 2022, the City of Goleta committed \$600,000 to the Housing Authority of Santa Barbara County to purchase and renovate a local motel to become permanent supportive housing for people experiencing chronic homelessness. Buena Tierra is located at the corner of Fairview Avenue and Hollister Avenue, on the edge of Goleta's Old Town, a historically disadvantaged area. Construction on the retrofit began in August 2022 and was completed in the Fall of 2023. Partial occupancy of the facility began in February 2024, with full occupancy occurring in June 2024. The ribbon-cutting ceremony was held on August 15, 2024. All 60 occupants of Buena Tierra are residents of the City of Goleta, formerly experiencing homelessness within the City of Goleta.

Seismic-related construction began on the Goleta Community Center in June 2023, a long-planned capital improvement project for the City. The seismic upgrades were completed in early 2024, and the grand re-opening of the Goleta Community Center occurred in April 2024. Following the completion of the seismic retrofit, the building will undergo disability access improvements to sidewalks, paths of travel, bathrooms, and sewer lines in the main building as required under the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). These projects are largely funded by federal grants from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), CDBG, and Community Project Funding, in addition to leveraging General Fund dollars to strengthen Old Town Goleta and community infrastructure.

**Assess how the jurisdiction’s use of funds, particularly CDBG, addresses the priorities and specific objectives identified in the plan, giving special attention to the highest priority activities identified.**

The PY 2023-2024 Action Plan focused on CDBG resources in the areas of youth and family resources to low-income persons, medical services, including chronic care case management for low-income persons, and those experiencing homelessness. It also directed considerable funding towards improvements to the Goleta Community Center and ADA Improvements at the intersection of Dearborn Place and Armitos Avenue, located in Old Town Goleta, Census Tract 30.01, the area with the city’s highest number of low- to moderate income people.

CDBG public service funding went to support the Isla Vista Youth Project's (LEAP) Family Resource Center and its work in the Goleta area to end the cycle of poverty, build a healthy community, and promote parental resilience. This includes case management, resource and referral, food assistance, parenting classes, and health screenings for children and families regardless of income. CDBG funding also supported the Santa Barbara Neighborhood Clinics’ Goleta Neighborhood Clinic comprehensive health and dental care services, including medical and dental care, mental health and counseling services, chronic care management, health education, health insurance enrollment assistance, and linkages to other community services for Goleta residents who are uninsured, under-insured, self-pay, and/or homeless. This includes expanding services to provide dental care to low-income Goleta residents. Peoples’ Self-Help Housing Corporation's Supportive Housing Program was also awarded CDBG funding

to support free clinical case management & homelessness prevention services to any of the 224 households consisting of 687 residents currently residing at Peoples' Self-Help Housing's five affordable, sliding-scale rental properties located within the City of Goleta.

The percentages spent in Old Town Goleta also benefit the Citywide Low- to Moderate-Income population, and the projects in Old Town Goleta include prior-year resources.



## Leveraging

**Explain how federal funds leveraged additional resources (private, state and local funds), including a description of how matching requirements were satisfied, as well as how any publicly owned land or property located within the jurisdiction that were used to address the needs identified in the plan.**

In addition to its CDBG entitlement grant, the City of Goleta allocated General Fund monies to public services, dedicated other grant funds, such as the State of California Housing-Related Parks Program, and leveraged State Gas Tax, ATP, and Measure A funding for the various infrastructure improvements in Old Town, the area with the highest percentage of low-to moderate-income residents.

The City paid \$37,000 from its General Fund to People Assisting the Homeless (PATH SB) for the provision of two reserved beds in its PATH Santa Barbara homeless shelter/ transitional housing program to serve Goleta-area homeless who are ready to enter a shelter and receive case management services. In addition to PATH, the City paid \$46,000 from its General Fund to the Good Samaritan Shelter Hedges House of Hope Program for four interim housing beds for people experiencing homelessness in the City of Goleta.

The Goleta City Grant program awarded \$250,000 in City General Fund grants to non-profits, many of which are organizations that serve low-income populations and people experiencing homelessness. The City participates in the Continuum of Care (CoC), a county-wide, collective impact collaborative of government agencies, non-profit organizations, foundations, faith communities, business and community leaders, other community groups, and individuals who have experienced homelessness.

The City of Goleta also spent \$261,000 in General Fund money on its continued partnership with City Net for homelessness outreach and bridge housing services. The partnership began in 2021 with \$190,000 in CDBG-CV funds. Those funds were expended in August 2022, at which time the City began spending its own General Funds to continue the service.

The City looked to help prevent low-income people from becoming homeless by providing rental and eviction prevention assistance by executing a \$60,000 per year contract in General Funds and American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Funds with the City of Santa Barbara's Rental Housing Mediation Program (RHMP). RHMP provides information to predominantly low-income tenants about their rights, assistance to people served with eviction notices, and mediation between tenants and landlords to help avoid eviction. This program served 201 Goleta residents in PY 2023, reflecting an increase of 62% from 124 for PY 2022.

The County of Santa Barbara won three California Encampment Relief Funds (CERF) from the California Interagency Council on Homelessness, providing direct benefits to the City of Goleta.

CERF-1 provided outreach, encampment clean-up, interim housing placement, and permanent housing support to people living in the CalTrans Highway 101 corridor and Union Pacific Railroad right of way. This \$2.52 million grant was projected to shelter seventy-five people and house fifty-four county-wide. In Goleta, forty-eight people were served, five were placed in permanent housing, and 21 entered interim housing. CityNet's work for this contract offset some of the funding that Goleta set aside for their contract, meaning that over \$100,000 in General Funds were saved in FY 23-24. The program ended on May 31, 2024. CERF-2, a \$6 million grant, had similar goals: to clear encampments (this time focused on waterways) and place people into interim and/or permanent housing. CERF-3, an \$8 million dollar grant, is focused on assisting people living in vehicles county-wide.

**Discuss the difference between goals and outcomes and problems encountered in meeting these goals.**

No goals were included in the five-year Consolidated Plan for affordable housing since the City of Goleta has limited resources to develop new affordable units. The City often relies on private developers to do so in conjunction with affordable housing providers and through compliance with the City's inclusionary housing requirements. Many obstacles to developing affordable housing in this area include the high costs of land, labor, and materials. As part of its adopted 2023-2031 Housing Element, the City has a program to streamline the permit-review process for 100-percent affordable housing projects, and the City Council allocated funds for affordable housing from the 2022 Measure B sales tax measure. These actions are intended to facilitate the production of affordable housing in the City.

**Discuss how these outcomes will impact future annual action plans.**

These outcomes will not directly impact future action plans. Staff will continue to research and explore public/private partnerships in constructing and developing affordable housing. The City will continue to look for opportunities to leverage County HOME funds and the City’s Affordable Housing Trust Fund (comprised of affordable housing in-lieu fee payments, non-residential affordable housing impact fees, and general fund monies) to assist private developers in constructing new affordable housing.

**Narrative Information**

No affordable units were constructed in this program year. However, the City of Goleta provided \$600,000 in American Rescue Plan Act funds for the Santa Barbara County Housing Authority’s purchase and retrofit of the Super 8 Motel Homekey Project, creating 60 Permanent Supportive Housing Units for the homeless in Goleta. Construction on the retrofit began in August 2022 and was completed in the Fall of 2023. Partial occupancy of the facility began in February 2024, with full occupancy occurring in June 2024.

The Heritage Ridge Apartment Project was approved in the City of Goleta in March of 2023. The project includes 102 affordable housing units for seniors and families in the low—and very low-income range. The Housing Authority of the County of Santa Barbara will construct and manage the units and has applied for low-income housing tax credits and tax-exempt bonds to finance construction.

## **CR-25 - Homeless and Other Special Needs 91.220(d, e); 91.320(d, e); 91.520(c)**

**Evaluate the jurisdiction's progress in meeting its specific objectives for reducing and ending homelessness through:**

**Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs**

The City of Goleta strives to reduce homelessness and to assist those who are homeless and unsheltered by using a portion of its CDBG award, and in some cases, City General Funds, to support agencies and organizations whose mission is to provide case management, emergency housing, and other services to homeless persons. These efforts are detailed below:

- \$564,000 Contract with CityNet for Professional Street Outreach and Bridge Housing Services to the Homeless (includes reservation of motel/hotel rooms). Funded by the City's General Fund.
- \$83,000 Contract with Santa Barbara Alliance for Community Transformation (SB ACT) for Goleta Regional Action Plan. Funded by the City's General Fund.
- \$54,500 Contract to New Beginnings to support its Safe Parking Program and outreach. Funded by the City's General Fund and City Grant Program (\$10,000 awarded through City Grants).
- \$13,802 CDBG Subrecipient Grant for Peoples' Self-Help Housing's Supportive Housing Program. Funded by CDBG.
- \$5,000 City Grant for the Showers of Blessing program, providing free showers to the homeless through the Goleta City Grant Program.
- \$7,100 City Grant for shelter and services for homeless families through Transition House. Funded by the Goleta City Grant Program.
- \$7,000 City Grant for St. Vincent's Family Strengthening Program, providing transitional housing and case management. Funded by the Goleta City Grant Program.

Homeless individuals in Goleta are being registered into the Coordinated Entry System and their progress is being tracked by the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) through CityNet. The data from HMIS shows 200 Goleta individuals enrolled into the system.

### **Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons**

Although Goleta has no official homeless shelter, the City continued to use General Fund monies to reserve two beds at the PATH SB homeless shelter for homeless individuals from Goleta. Additionally, the Hedges House of Hope, owned by the County of Santa Barbara and operated by Good Samaritan Shelter, offers 50 beds per night of emergency shelter in Isla Vista, a community that borders Goleta. The City of Goleta has four beds reserved at Hedges House of Hope.

**Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: likely to become homeless after being**

**discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); and, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs**

The City of Goleta looked to help low-income people avoid becoming homeless by providing rental and eviction prevention assistance through the City's two-year contract with the City of Santa Barbara's Rental Housing Mediation Program (RHMP). The City of Goleta provided \$60,000 in General Funds and ARPA monies to support the RHMP, which provides information to predominantly low-income tenants about their rights, assistance to people served with eviction notices, and mediation between tenants and landlords to help people avoid eviction and address other problems.

As mentioned earlier, the City of Goleta also allocated a portion of its CDBG funding to homeless service providers and nonprofits that provided various services and assistance to low-income people, including utility assistance, weekly food baskets, and medical assistance. These services filled the gaps for those families and individuals that were on the verge of becoming homeless and allowed them to dedicate more of their financial resources to housing costs.

**Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again**

The City of Goleta's goals included reducing the incidence of homelessness and addressing the needs of homeless persons, including transitioning to permanent housing and independent living. The City helped achieve this through its support of agencies that provided these services and participation in area organizations that share these goals. The City accomplished this by investing CDBG, ARPA, and General Fund dollars to support various organizations such as CityNet, New Beginnings, SB ACT, PATH SB Shelter, Transition House, and others. In addition, City staff and/or elected officials participated in the Elected Leaders Forum on Homelessness, Community Stakeholder Engagement led by the Santa Barbara Alliance for Community Transformation (SB ACT), Joint Cities-County Affordable Housing Task Group, and on the Continuum of Care Board.

## **CR-30 - Public Housing 91.220(h); 91.320(j)**

### **Actions taken to address the needs of public housing**

The Housing Authority of the County of Santa Barbara serves Santa Barbara County and the City of Goleta. Within the City of Goleta, the Housing Authority provides Section 8 rental assistance for 164 of its affordable rental housing units, including four units for special needs people. The Housing Authority was founded on the belief that decent, safe, and sanitary housing is central to the physical and emotional health, productivity, and self-esteem of the people it serves. The agency's mission is to provide affordable housing opportunities for low-income households in the County of Santa Barbara (including Goleta) in an environment which preserves personal dignity, and in a manner which maintains the public trust.

The Housing Authority has accomplished the conversion of its public housing projects through the establishment of a nonprofit affiliate; disposition of the units to this nonprofit affiliate; and then use of tax-exempt financing/credits to finance rehabilitation of the units. The units remain affordable and Section 8 vouchers have been issued for any tenants displaced during renovation of the units. As funding allows, the Housing Authority has carried out modifications needed in its public housing stock based on the Section 504 Needs Assessment. The Housing Authority recently completed Buena Tierra, a former Super 8 Motel in Old Town Goleta, renovated into a new Homekey project to create 60 permanent supportive housing units for formerly homeless people. The City of Goleta contributed \$600,000 in ARPA funds towards the purchase and retrofit of this property.

### **Actions taken to encourage public housing residents to become more involved in management and participate in homeownership**

Each public housing project owned and/or managed by the Housing Authority of the County of Santa Barbara has an established Resident Council, whose members are elected by residents in that project. The Council holds regular public meetings and brings concerns and recommendations directly to the Housing Authority. The Housing Authority also has a Section 8 homeownership program, although the high cost of housing limits it. The Housing Authority also administers a Mortgage Credit Certificate Program that assists lower income first-time homebuyers.

### **Actions taken to provide assistance to troubled PHAs**

The Housing Authority of Santa Barbara County is not considered to be a troubled PHA (Public Housing Authority).

## **CR-35 - Other Actions 91.220(j)-(k); 91.320(i)-(j)**

**Actions taken to remove or ameliorate the negative effects of public policies that serve as barriers to affordable housing such as land use controls, tax policies affecting land, zoning ordinances, building codes, fees and charges, growth limitations, and policies affecting the return on residential investment. 91.220 (j); 91.320 (i)**

In the City of Goleta, the largest barrier to affordable housing development continues to be the extremely high cost of real estate and development costs. There are also governmental constraints to affordable housing development that include land use policies governed by the Land Use Element of the General Plan, zoning regulations, and development fees imposed by the jurisdiction. The City's Housing Element is required to provide a detailed assessment of public policy constraints and to develop strategies to alleviate the constraints on the development of new housing, particularly those that act as barriers to affordable housing.

During the PY, the City updated the Housing Element for the 2023-2031 planning period. This included a detailed analysis of local constraints on housing production. Based on this analysis, the Housing Element included several programs to address constraints. This includes several zoning amendments to facilitate better housing production (including for emergency shelters, supportive housing, and low-barrier navigation centers) and a review of impact fees applied to affordable housing projects.

On April 4, 2023, the City updated its ADU regulations, consistent with changes in State law. These changes will further support the permitting and construction of ADUs within the City. Under the City's zoning regulations, ADUs under 750 square feet are exempt from development impact fees. Additional regulatory changes are planned to allow for streamlined ministerial permitting of certain affordable housing projects.

## **Actions taken to address obstacles to meeting underserved needs. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)**

The City of Goleta provided the maximum amount of CDBG funding (15% of its allocation) towards public services, which addressed the needs of youth, low-income, and people experiencing homelessness, including providing essential needs such as health care.

There is a need within the City, particularly the City's Old Town district, for public facilities that serve underserved populations, rehabilitation of aging facilities, and ADA accessibility improvements and upgrades. Needed public facilities include parks and recreational amenities, flood control improvements, sidewalks, and street improvements. To address these unmet needs, the City allocated its 2022-2023 CDBG funds to seismic and ADA accessibility improvements at the Goleta Community Center and ADA improvements at the intersection of Dearborn Place and Armitos Avenue, both projects located in Old Town. The Goleta Community Center ADA project is still in design, while the Dearborn/Armitos ADA Improvement Project was completed during the PY.



In an effort to address underserved needs, City staff also continued to research the availability of future funding resources and used proactive approaches toward applications for the potential to leverage its CDBG funds.

### **Actions taken to reduce lead-based paint hazards. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)**

The Santa Barbara County Public Health Department works in coordination with the California Department of Health Services, Childhood Lead Poisoning Branch for program planning, outreach, case management, investigation, and surveillance of lead poisoned children.

A Public Health Nurse (PHN) identifies and provides case management to lead-burdened children throughout the county and provides outreach and education to the community. A multi-departmental Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention (CLPP) Team, which includes representatives from the Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) program, California Children Services (CCS), Environmental Health Services, Community Health Division Program Administration, and the County Fire Department-HAZMAT (hazardous materials), meets quarterly to plan outreach activities, prepare educational materials, resolve current issues, and discuss responsibilities in investigating lead poisoning cases. This program has increased lead screening done on children at risk for lead poisoning.

The City of Goleta also made copies of the most recent EPA publication, *Renovate Right: Important Lead Hazard Information for Families, Child Care Providers and Schools*, available to the public at City Hall. In addition, the City's Planning and Environmental Review Department provided the most recent EPA educational brochures on lead poisoning to anyone seeking a permit or information for renovation of a residence, day care center or school which includes work on a structure older than 1978. The City does not use CDBG funds to rehabilitate housing units.

### **Actions taken to reduce the number of poverty-level families. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)**

The City of Goleta supported various public service programs, both with its CDBG funding and General Funds, to provide essential services aimed at helping to reduce the number of poverty-level families. This included support of programs such as the Santa Barbara Neighborhood Clinics that meet the critical needs of families by providing free to low-cost medical and dental care to low-income people, providing funding to Isla Vista Youth Projects (LEAP) to address a variety of needs for low-income families with children and supporting food-based programs such as those offered by the Foodbank of Santa Barbara County, Food From the Heart, Unity Shoppe, Inc.'s Food Replenishment for Low-Income Families, and Organic Soup Kitchen Basic Needs: Food Security.

### **Actions taken to develop institutional structure. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)**

One of the institutional gaps identified was that few services are located in the City of Goleta, so residents have to travel to receive services. The City continued to work with service providers to offer services in Goleta and support those programs with CDBG and/or City General Fund money. This year, the City

assisted the Santa Barbara Neighborhood Clinics in supporting their medical clinic and dental clinic in Goleta, which provide free or low-cost medical and dental care to Goleta residents.

**Actions taken to enhance coordination between public and private housing and social service agencies. 91.220(k); 91.320(j)**

The City continued to collaborate with public and private housing and social service agencies to meet the goals and objectives of the Consolidated Plan. This included ongoing meetings, special meetings, and/or participation in relevant task forces such as the South Coast Housing Task Force, the HOME Consortium, and the Continuum of Care (CoC).

**Identify actions taken to overcome the effects of any impediments identified in the jurisdictions analysis of impediments to fair housing choice. 91.520(a)**

Because the City participates in the Santa Barbara HOME Consortium, the City participated in the preparation of the Analysis of Impediments (AI). The Consortium completed it without specific goals for Goleta. However, the City has contributed to the overall County goals by addressing the following action items in the County's AI:

- Increase affordable housing opportunities
- Increase focus on and partnerships to better coordinate service delivery to at-risk populations
- Provide greater access to financial counseling for minority and Hispanic applicants and increase outreach to lenders to address concerns in denial rates; and
- Continue supporting programs to improve landlord-tenant relationships and fair housing education.

The City of Goleta continued to contract with the City of Santa Barbara for its Rental Housing Mediation Program (RHMP) services, which provided education and information about landlord/tenant rights and responsibilities. The contract also provided for telephone mediation in rental housing disputes. A total of 201 people were assisted by Goleta funding for this Program. Services included staff consultations, provision of information and printed materials relating to Landlord-Tenant rights and responsibilities, referrals to social service agencies, and mediation services to resolve tenant/landlord disputes. The City also maintains a Fair Housing page on the City's website to provide information in Spanish and English, educating residents regarding their rights under Fair Housing laws and how they may obtain assistance if they believe they are victims of discrimination.

In addition to links to the RHMP, there are links on the City's Fair Housing webpage to the Legal Aid Foundation, California Department of Fair Employment and Housing, and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development Office of Fair Housing. On the site is a link to the California Guide to Residential Tenants' and Landlords' Rights and Responsibilities, the County's Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice, HUD's Tenant Rights, Laws and Protections, and California and National Association of Realtors Fair Housing Information.

As part of the City's Housing Element, an analysis of affirmatively furthering fair housing was conducted. This analysis resulted in a detailed program in the Housing Element to implement actions related to affirmatively furthering fair housing. This program will be implemented throughout the next eight years.

## **CR-40 - Monitoring 91.220 and 91.230**

**Describe the standards and procedures used to monitor activities carried out in furtherance of the plan and used to ensure long-term compliance with requirements of the programs involved, including minority business outreach and the comprehensive planning requirements**

To implement an effective CDBG program, the City monitors CDBG activities consistently through quarterly desktop reviews of performance reports submitted by subrecipients, including client data, invoices, and expense reports. In June 2024, City staff conducted in-depth, onsite monitoring reviews of the three public services subrecipients: Peoples' Self-Help Housing, Isla Vista Youth Projects, Inc. (LEAP), and Santa Barbara Neighborhood Clinics. For each visit, City staff was provided a tour of the facility, allowing for the opportunity to see the subrecipients' missions in action, and went through a list of exhibits with subrecipient staff to ensure that records were being kept per HUD standards. On-site monitoring visits determine if the subrecipient is carrying out its program and activities within the parameters denoted in the subrecipient agreement. Monitoring also ensures that the required records are maintained to demonstrate compliance with applicable regulations.

For corrective actions, when identified, subrecipients are given written notifications of violations within 30 days of the review date and are required to submit corrections within thirty days of the date of the compliance review letter to avoid noncompliance penalties such as more frequent reporting and/or additional file audits. Throughout the program year, CDBG administrative staff also provided technical assistance, as needed, to the City Public Works and General Services Departments in relation to CDBG-funded capital projects, and to subrecipients in relation to administrative as well as financial compliance with all HUD regulations.

## **Citizen Participation Plan 91.105(d); 91.115(d)**

**Describe the efforts to provide citizens with reasonable notice and an opportunity to comment on performance reports.**

The City published public notices in English and Spanish providing a 15-day public review period for the Draft CAPER and providing an opportunity for the public to submit comments. The public review period for the CAPER was **September 5, 2024 to September 23, 2024**.

The 15-day notices for this CAPER were published in the Santa Barbara Independent (*English version*) and in El Latino (*Spanish version*) on **September 5, 2024**. A notice of availability of the Draft CAPER and request for public comments was also posted on the City's website. The Draft CAPER was also considered by the City Council at a public hearing on **September 17, 2024**, providing another opportunity for the public to comment on this annual performance report document for the CDBG program. Two public comments were received during the 15-day review period and are included in the report.

# CA demanda a TikTok por violar derechos de menores

**C**alifornia amplía su batalla legal contra TikTok, el Departamento de Justicia ha presentado este viernes una demanda contra la popular red social de videos y su empresa matriz, ByteDance.

California amplía su batalla legal contra TikTok, el Departamento de Justicia ha presentado este viernes una demanda contra la popular red social de videos y su empresa matriz, ByteDance.

La justicia estadounidense acusa a la aplicación de recolectar y guardar información de sus usuarios, incluidos millones de menores de 13 años. Esto sin el consentimiento de los padres, lo que supone una violación a una ley federal de protección a la infancia de 1998.

El caso podría derivar en una multa para la compañía basada en China.

La demanda, presentada ante los tribunales en Los Ángeles, asegura que TikTok permitió a los menores de edad crear cuentas para ver y subir vídeos e interactuar con otros usuarios, algunos de ellos adultos, mediante mensajes.

“Las empresas acusadas recolectaron y retuvieron una gran cantidad de información personal de est@s niñ@s sin notificar u obtener el permiso de sus padres”, señala el Departamento de Justicia. La institución afirma que las compañías “fracasaban” cuando los padres de los menores solicitaban el borrado de los datos privados. “También tienen deficientes e ineficaces políticas internas para identificar y borrar cuentas

creadas por niños”, continúa el comunicado.

Washington cree que TikTok y ByteDance han violado desde 2019 y hasta el presente la Ley de Protección a la Privacidad de los Menores en línea (COPPA por sus siglas en inglés).

Los fiscales estiman que las empresas incluso guardaban ilegalmente los correos electrónicos y otro tipo de información personal en las cuentas creadas bajo el modo niñ@s, una alternativa al servicio que ofrece TikTok.

Un portavoz de TikTok ha respondido a las acciones legales afirmando que la demanda cita viejas prácticas que han sido eliminadas.

“Nos enorgullecen los esfuerzos que hemos puesto en marcha para proteger a los menores, que seguiremos llevando a cabo para ampliar y mejorar nuestra plataforma”, dijo el vocero a través de un comunicado.

Este caso se desprende de un caso iniciado por el FTC, el regulador antimonopolios, que también lleva casos de protección al consumidor.

Lina Khan, su presidenta, aseguró en junio que las operaciones de TikTok amenazan la seguridad de millones de usuarios porque emplean “sofisticadas herramientas diseñadas para vigilar a menores y obtener ganancias con este tipo de información”.

La FTC llevó el caso al D. de Justicia en junio.

Entonces comenzaron a correr 45 días para que este decidiera si lo llevaba a los tribunales. Ese plazo ha finalizado este viernes.

La demanda se suma a los esfuerzos que el Gobierno de Estados Unidos lleva a cabo para contener el poder de la red social, usada por 170 millones de personas en el país.

En abril, el Presidente Joe Biden cedió a las presiones de los republican@s y firmó una ley que puede prohibir el uso de TikTok a nivel nacional si la aplicación no abandona el portafolio de ByteDance. ■
